

Digital dentistry - 3D Scanner and 3DPrinter



3-D PRINTER SETUP

Inderprastha Dental College & Hospital (IPDC) believes in continuously upgrading the exposure of student to new technologies being introduced in to the dental world. This approach keeps IPDC, always a step ahead in dental education. In this regard, IPDC recently procured a state of the art 3-D Scanner DW-IO-100. An Intraoral Scanner is a dental 3D scanner intended to be used for digital records of topographical characteristics of teeth and surrounding tissues. The 3D scanning system produces digital 3D models, used in dentistry such as diagnostic models, treatment planning, treatment prediction, laboratory transfer, record keeping.

The combination of 3-D Scanner and printer has boosted the learning and understanding for students. Final year undergraduates learn to use these equipments during their postings in the Department of Orthodontics and Prosthodontics. Students appreciate the precisions in their impressions and understand how digital impressions can benefit both patient and dentist. Our Post-Graduate students have been using printer to fabricate clear aligners and delivering high quality treatment to the patients. Scanning and printing is now an integral part of practice by students and staff to deliver precise treatment in less time.



"INDERPRASTHA DENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MISSION" RAISPUR VILLAGE

Inderprastha Dental programme "INDERPRASTHA DENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MISSION" in association with gram panchayat Raispur, was set up with an aim to provide oral health awareness and treatment to people in rural areas.

Firstly, the drive started with the door-to-door health awareness campaign conducted by students in the village. The people were motivated to practice good oral hygiene and seek the primary treatment in their own neighbourhood. For this, IPDC established a clinic in Village Raispur, which provided free treatment to villagers in their vicinity and opportunity for college student to work in rural set up.

IPDC also provides transportation facility from Raispur village to college on every Wednesday, for all those patients who seek advance dental treatment.

Quit Tobacco- A Mission of IPDC

Tobacco use is described as the single most preventable cause of morbidity and mortality globally, with the World Bank predicting over 450 million tobacco-related deaths in the next fifty years. In India, the proportion of all deaths that can be attributed to tobacco use is expected to rise. Thus, Tobacco Cessation is the most effective way of health intervention to reduce the impact of tobacco related mortality and morbidity.

Consumption of Gutka is common, needs reinforcement / counselling among patients to quit the dreadful habit – making Tobacco Counselling Centre (TCC) an absolute necessity. Our college is surrounded by many industries, which provides us opportunity to cater industrial workers in whom the use of tobacco is very common.

The Department of Public Health Dentistry, Inderprastha Dental College & Hospital, Sahibabad has state of the art TCC along with Nicotine Replacement Therapy (NRT) regimes to make it simple and easy for patients to motivate them to quit the habit. It is the most effective way of health intervention to reduce the impact of tobacco related mortality and morbidity. Thus, IPDC committed itself to get these workers quit the habit.

Hence, two industries were identified in vicinity. The management of industry were approached and informed about our mission "Commit to Quit". Memorandums of understanding were signed between P.Ent Labels Pvt Ltd and IPDC and Holyfaith Pvt Ltd and IPDC.

All the workers of the industry were screened for oral health status and tobacco users were identified. Thereafter, tobacco cessation habit counselling was done. The identified workers are then regularly counselled to quit the habit.

Anemia Makt Bharat



An event was conducted by Inderprastha dental college and hospital on ABC of Women's Health, A-Anaemia, B-Blood (Hemoglobin), C-Cervical Cancer as all these are raising health issues among women's health. This event was held in collaboration with Delhi Gynaecologist Forum (DGF), Healthy Trust India and M-Cure. This successful event was held under the guidance of Dr. Rahul Paul and was organised by Dr. Manish Bhalla. The guest speaker for the event was the famous gynaecologists from India, Dr. Sharda Jain (MD, MNAMS, FICOG, FIMSA, DHM, QM&AHO, PGDMLS) and Dr. Shama Batra(MD, FICOG). They enlighten the audience about cervical cancer and Iron Deficiency Anaemia.

Cervical cancer is a type of cancer that occurs in the cells of the cervix — the lower part of the uterus that connects to the vagina. Various strains of the human papillomavirus (HPV), a sexually transmitted infection, play a role in causing most cervical cancer. When exposed to HPV, the body's immune system typically prevents the virus from doing harm. In a small percentage of people, however, the virus survives for years contributing to the process that causes some cervical cells to become cancer cells.

This lecture elaborated on prevention of cervical cancer and also emphasised on vaccination as it can reduce the risk of developing cervical cancer by having screening tests. Additionally, receiving a vaccine gives protection against HPV infection.

Iron deficiency anemia is a common type of anemia. It is a condition in which blood lacks adequate healthy red blood cells. Red blood cells carry oxygen to the body's tissues. As the name implies, iron deficiency anemia is due to insufficient iron. Without enough iron, our body can't produce enough of a substance called Hemoglobin in red blood cells that enables them to carry oxygen. As a result, iron deficiency anemia may leave us tired and short of breath. One can usually correct iron deficiency anemia with iron supplementation. But Sometimes additional tests or treatments for iron deficiency anemia are necessary, Henceforth doctors advice should be taken.

Department of Periodontics



The Department of Periodontology, Inderprastha Dental College and Hospital, was started in the year 2005 and is focused on didactic lectures and clinical work for the training of the students to manage the investing and supporting tissues around the teeth and dental implants. The Post Graduate course was started in 2015 with an intake of 3 students per year. The Department has well equipped state of art sterilization room, two major clinical sections, (for Post Graduate Students and Undergraduate students) & specialized Laser and Implant Surgery Rooms. The newest addition for session 2022-2023 is approval for 2 more postgraduate admissions per session, with the department being graced with 5 new postgraduates/year, hereafter. Extended postgraduate section added to the infrastructure of the department.



EXTENSION AND OUTREACH PROGRAM

Our Department of Periodontology was among the selected elite few, which was enrolled for conducting national level programs in association withIndian Society of Periodontology,colleges which have been chosen from all over India to be part of the World Diabetes Day and World Heart Day Programmes.

ISP-WDD Programme : The programme was held to spread awareness about the link between Periodontitis and Diabetes in Indian population assessing 100 patients for their blood glucose levels using a Glucometer in the department. Department of Oral Pathology & Microbiology



Oral Pathology is a field of dentistry which includes Dental Anatomy, Histology, Embryology and Pathology. Clinical Dentistry is largely based on the groundwork of study of Dental Anatomy and Histology. The Department of Oral & Maxillofacial Pathology was timehonored in year 2007. The department is spread over an area of about 6000 sq ft with well designed chambers allotted for clinical examination, student's laboratory and museum with numerous mounted specimens, models and posters. The department has a well operational histopathology lab for tissue processing with all essential armamentarium to facilitate practice and accurate diagnosis for suitable treatment plan. Department also possesses ultramodern research microscope with multiple attachments in single apparatus along with photo micrographic attachment. The undergraduate students are trained to acquire the skills in recognition and carving of permanent teeth, age estimation using plaster casts of different age groups, study of teeth anomalies through specimen and plaster casts and microscopic identifications of oral tissues as well as common oral lesions. The department also motivates students to participate in various intercollege events. The team of teaching faculty is committed to high excellence in undergraduate teachings and workings of the department.



The department is equipped with state of the art infrastructure and has facilities for histopathology, cytology, and hematology services.

Department of Oral Medicine and Radiology



Oral Medicine and Radiology is the speciality of Dentistry that deals with the diagnosis and management of oral diseases, disorders and conditions affecting the maxillofacial region and also includes the use of maxillofacial imaging techniques. Oral medicine is involved in patient care, teaching and research involving diagnosis and non surgical management of diseases of Orofacial complex, systemic and behavioural disorders that impact oral health including:-

- o Orofacial pain including TMD
- o Oral Mucosal disorder
- o Oral cancer and complications of cancer therapy
- o Dental care for patients with disability
- o Neurosensory and motor disorders
- o Salivary dysfunction
- o Oral complications of systemic illness
- o Craniofacial imaging and other diagnosis.

The department was established in the year 2006; well equipped with 16 dental chairs, 2 general body x – ray machines, 3 OPG machines and 3 IOPA machines to facilitate diagnosis for appropriate treatment plan. It also includes the Kodak 8000c Digital Panoramic and Cephalometric system also with laser printer (care stream).RVG is also available for intraoral radiography





Other diagnostic aids such as pulp testing machines, smear, swab and stains, biopsy for potentially malignant disorders, habit counselling of such patients through medical management are also available.

The Department is also running a tobacco cessation centre in collaboration with Department of Public Health Dentistry to help the patients to quit habit s such as with smokeless and smoking tobacco.



The department is having well established OROFACIAL PAIN CLINIC which deals with the management of conditions of pain especially those due to TMJ and muscle disorders, pain or burning due to premalignant disorders, ulcers .TENS and therapeutic ultrasound therapy are also frequently given to TMD patients used with recall visit used for cervico- facial muscle disorders.

All MDS Staff have publications in various national and international journals. The subject is made interesting for the Undergraduate Students by means of adopting new and innovative teaching methods for instance case discussions, project based learning .Students are encouraged to present seminar, e – poster for patient education and also have won awards in U.G. convention.

Department of Public Health Dentistry



The Department of Public Health Dentistry inInderprastha Dental College and Hospital, Ghaziabad, is running successfully the Under Graduate course since 2006 as approved by Dental council of India. Our department is offering training, research and community health services through its various outdoor activities in form of dental camps organized for different sections of society, mobile and satellite clinics apart from its regular indoor treatment facilities. We are conducting the dental camps from 2006 onwards with inception of Undergraduate Department. Department has adopted 1 satellite centre in Sahibabad Village. It is a multispeciality satellite clinic providing all dental care facilities to the people who report there. In case of emergency, the patient will be referred to the college for further services. The department has a well-equipped Mobile Dental Unit with two dental chairs which helps the dental health care team to reach out to under served segments of the population. Another outreach dental activity of the department includes village camps. Oral health education is regularly rendered to village people and they are positively reinforced for maintaining oral health. Children requiring further treatment are referred to college. There are five adopted schools where annual oral health check-up, treatment and preventive programmes are rendered.

TOBACCO CESSATION CENTER



Objective:

The TCC is a special service run by department of PHD in coordination with department of OMR in order to aid persons wishing to quit smoking or chewing tobacco and tobacco containing products.

Current Programme:

Tobacco cessation center has been established under Department of Public Health Dentistry and Department of Oral Medicine & Radiology since 1st November 2018 as per the operational guidelines laid down by the DCI. It is situated on the Ground Floor near the registration area. The center operates on daily basis with a monthly schedule of posting of staff along with interns. We have outlined clear structured protocol for performing individual & optionally group counseling along with record keeping. Patients undergo a detailed evaluation, which focuses on the severity of their addiction and use, their motivation to quit, assessment of their current oral condition. They are then counselled regarding appropriate strategies to aid quitting, which is usually a combination of medicines to reduce the urge and craving for nicotine as well as behavioral strategies to deal with the consequences of quitting. The group sessions if conducted are planned & performed on designated days. Around 5000 patients were diagnosed and educated regarding tobacco cessation habit till date.

Vision:

Our vision is to promote individual and community responsibity in preventing and reducing tobacco use. To attain this goal, in addition to the existing tobacco cessation model, we plan to conduct camps in nearby villages and adopt families with multiple dental needs along with tobacco habits which will be controlled at our center and all the dental needs taken care off as well. We will use various audiovisual aids for patient education and motivation at each step. This will be our small step towards a tobacco free society and reducing the morbidity and mortality associated with tobacco use.

Live-in partners have enough time to get to know each other well and make an informed decision about getting married or breaking up without any additional expectations. You can discover how your other half lives, habits, expectations, and quirks. So what's your call on this? A match made in heaven sort of married life? Or an understanding of living in a relationship?

DRISHTI (BATCH 2017)

Every individual has a basic and fundamental right to have a partner. In Asian countries, the concept of marriage is considered vital, and in every religion it is considered as a sacred and blissful union. Marriage is a social union or a legal contract between people that creates kinship. Marriage has acceptance from the society and since time immemorial it has been working as a union for maintaining the balance in nature. Live-in relationship is a very sensitive yet a relevant issue to discuss. In live-in relationship two individual decide to live together and support each other emotionally and physically without getting married. It is a well-established notion that usually the couples who are afraid of commitments, or a life-long promise and responsibility prefer this. It's just like marriage where two people live together, tackle situations, hardships, crisis in all ways, be it emotionally, economically, mentally or physically. For years since now, the traditional society has not completely accepted or approved this live-in concept. According to them, as per custom a union without promises, sacred rituals, and intention to complete each other is nothing but only an arrangement for fulfilling one's own needs. It is considered as an arrangement of living together or conducting a short term compatibility check in spite of going through the long process of marriage commitments, trust, respect, communication, patience and companionship. However there is still a chaos on determining the real meaning of livein-relationship. There are many cases around us, where the couple has been living together for a week, months or years, surely such cohabitation raises a strong question mark for its acceptance. As per Webster's dictionary, live-in-relationship is living arrangement where unmarried couples live together in a long term relationship resembling marriage. Here, it is interesting to note that there is always a risk of couples getting detached from each other leading to the end of live-in arrangement. In case of marriages, the concept of divorce can be equated with such exits, but still talking about or believing in live-in-relationship concept is considered taboo and dilution of morals and ethics. The benefits of a marriage comes with lots of responsibilities, the obligation towards family, children etc. Live-in on the other hand gives the couple a chance to prepare for such responsibilities, along with the challenges of today's living. If we talk about the comparison between the two situations, marriage could either a forced one or could have the consent of both however live-in can never be forced, it always comes with the choice of both partners, thus creating and sense of equality and acceptability among both of them. In a live-in relationship couples get ample amount of time to think about their relationship, their duties, their work because here it's not forced and something which is not forced on anyone gives a sense of power to both in a relation.

No legal or social process is required in a live-in-relationship, whereas marriages are bound by the law and society. However, marriage being a well-accepted union and prevalent medium of establishing kinship and mutual affection, has always given ample amount of respect and acceptance from our senior citizens or elderly people. In a live-in-relationship society always questions girl's character as it is considered immoral in maximum part of the country. Many a times the couple living in live-in face extra trouble for their choice, trouble like always being judged by everyone, those said or unsaid judgements and many more, which forces them to guit. However, in marriage the social influence is so high that it holds a strong grip on the sacred union upto a great extent. Talking about the legality of live-in-relationship and marriage, in a leading case of Tulsi and others vs Durghatiya and others, the Honourable Supreme court has considered that a man and a woman who are in live-in-relationship for a longer period would be considered as married couple and children will be legitimate. Parliament while passing Domestic violence act, 2005, has taken notice of such livein-relationships and extended protection to the women living in such relationships. The Indian system do not recognise live-in-relationship independent of the institution of marriage, and the presumption of marriage is the key element in consideration. Sociologists have observed that informal unions are less stable than marriages because they don't come under any institution, it completely survives on will and consent of couple. The need of the present hour is to bring live-in-relationships under ambit of new regulations as to clarify obligations and future perspective i.e, protecting women's rights. The present situation of marriage is still regulated by laws and personal religious commands, but for live-in there is no such scenario. This phenomena is digging deep in the social fabric and is posing a big and bold challenge to marriages. It is rather a matter of personal prudence as to their acceptability in our society.

- There are lesser responsibilities towards the partner in a live-in relation as compared to marriage in social and legal bonds.

- It is also believed that although there are financial freedom to the partners in a live-in relation but very less or zero probability of commitment.
